On behalf of the Aurora Fire Department personnel, I respectfully submit for review the 2006 Annual Report, an illustration of the department's most significant accomplishments of the last twelve months. Included within the 2006 Annual Report is statistical data from several divisions, which serve as examples of the department's various and diverse activities.

In 2006 the City and Fire Department embraced a new way of doing business. Following the Franklin Covey goal-setting program, the Fire Department aligned itself to support two of the City's Wildly Important Goals (WIGs) and established one of its own. It is a constant challenge to remain focused on these goals among our emergency response and daily duties, but the department and its members have demonstrated their commitment to this process and will go forward in 2007.

In May 2006 the City received notification from the Insurance Service Office (ISO) that its Public Protection Classification (PPC) had been elevated from a Class 3 to a Class 2.

2006 was a year of celebration as the department recognized its 150th Year Anniversary with a three-day event in June.

The long-awaited Fire Station #8 replacement project is well underway and is scheduled for completion in late 2007.

To that end, through the efforts of all the members of our department, I wish to thank the residents of Aurora for the opportunity to serve them, and extend my sincere appreciation to City officials for their continued support in our advancement of life safety initiatives Citywide.

The continued support of the City Administration has given the Aurora Fire Department the ability to respond to over 15,000 calls for fire/rescue and EMS services in 2006.

The implementation of new ambulance fees went into effect March 1, 2006; these rates had remained unchanged since 1993. The increase will provide additional revenues to the City of Aurora and will more closely reflect the cost of the services provided. The department also took delivery of a new ambulance, Medic 4, in December 2006.


The long-awaited groundbreaking for the new Fire Station / Call Center on the East side of Aurora took place in late summer. This building will replace the current Fire Station #8 at McCoy and Gregory and will be completed in the fall of 2007. The City and the Aurora Fire Department will continue to support the Regional Training Facility run by the Southern Kane County Training Association.

The Aurora Fire Department successfully completed our Wildly Important Goal (WIG) of reducing response times by 10% in 2006. We also set up a system to report suspicious activity to the Aurora Police Department to help support the City's WIG of reducing shootings by 20%. The improved ISO rating of 2, which was achieved in 2006, will help support the City's WIG of attracting new business and investors to the City. The department's remaining WIG, to implement a personal fitness standard, was enthusiastically supported by our employees.

OPERATIONS



ASSISTANT CHIEF JOHN LEHMAN, OPERATIONS

The Operations Office oversees the Training Division as well as the fire suppression and rescue operations of the Aurora Fire Department. The Operations Office directs all special teams. In 2006, the Aurora Fire Department responded to over 15,294 calls for emergency service.

The Operations Office is also responsible for the department's involvement in the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS). This system aids fire departments throughout the State of Illinois who are able to request assistance and support from other member departments in the event of an emergency response.

The Aurora Fire Department has teamed with MABAS Division XIII to provide Hazardous Materials coverage to the Division.

The Aurora Fire Department has a vested interest in the Southern Kane County Training Association. In 2006 this training organization continued to be a leader in the State of Illinois in providing firefighter training. The site itself has also seen great progress in 2006, with the creation of the collapse pile, as well as a residential collapse building. The burn tower construction has been completed and the tower is operational. The Aurora Fire Department sees this as a valuable training tool for the future of our organization.

The Operations Department continues to provide the resources and training necessary for our firefighters to accomplish their jobs safely and effectively. We look forward to a safe and productive 2007 for the men and women of the Aurora Fire Department.

TRAINING DIVISION



BATTALION CHIEF MARK LOCKWOOD

A great deal of training was accomplished in 2006 with a total of 74,861 hours of "regularly" scheduled training. In addition, there were 77 firefighters who participated in various special teams and fire training totaling 3,480 hours.

The Aurora Fire Department submitted 30 claims for reimbursement to the Office of the State Fire Marshal, Division of Personnel Standards and Education. These included training for Firefighter II and III as well as Fire Prevention Principles, Tactics and Strategy, Management, Fire Service Instructor, Fire Apparatus Engineer and Haz-Mat Technician.

Some of the classes, seminars and courses attended by our firefighters were: Fire Company / Command Officers Class, Smoke Divers, R.I.T. Under Fire, Engine and Truck Company classes, Hazardous Materials classes, Technical Rescue classes, Arson classes, Fire Department Instructors Conference, as well as many Live Fire Training Evolutions in acquired structures. Fire Command personnel had attended a National Fire Academy; Command and General Staff Functions, as part of the National Incident Management curriculum. A few members attended classes at the National Fire Academy in Emmetsburg, Maryland.

SOUTHERN KANE COUNTY TRAINING ASSOCIATION

In accordance with a signed Intergovernmental Agreement with the Southern Kane County Training Association and the North Aurora Fire Protection District, the Aurora Fire Department continued its efforts to establish a regional training facility at 300 Butterfield Road in North Aurora. This facility is open and is being used by its members and associate members, as well as a host for Illinois Fire Service Institute and Southern Kane County Training Association classes.

The site now has an operational four-story "can prop" used for SCBA training, search, confined space, laddering, rappelling and many, many other drills. The five-story burn tower/taxpayer is also up and functioning and used to provide live fire conditions during fire evolutions.

Several members of the Aurora Fire Department have been trained as Safety Coordinators at the facility. They will be responsible for the proper and safe use of the facility during the live fire evolutions.

The Southern Kane County Training Association continues to seek funding through grants and other avenues.





Battalion Chief Tom Greiner Administrative Support Officer

ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT OFFICER

As Administrative Support Officer, Battalion Chief Tom Greiner assists Administration with budget development, internal affairs, and departmental investigations. He assists the Support Services Office in the areas of communications, computer systems, building and grounds, and other administrative duties. He directs and supervises the Logistics Officer and works in conjunction with the Operations Office and Training Department in the development of command level training programs.

The Administrative Support Officer is the SCBA/Respiratory administrator for the department and is responsible for ensuring compliance with all applicable regulations.

He works with the Fire Marshal to oversee and coordinate the Department's prepran program. Battanon Ciner Gremer serves on the Northeastern Illinois Communications Consortium, a multi-agency committee formed to plan for future communications requirements.

Battalion Chief Greiner is the Grants Coordinator and Grievance Officer for the Department.

Over 350 preplan drawings were submitted by the individual fire companies for digitization and installation into the vehicle laptop computers in 2006. The ability of a company to obtain information on an occupancy that they are responding to will enhance safety and efficiency.

The year 2006 saw an improvement in interagency communications. Software was purchased that enabled the in-house programming of the department's VHF portable radios. The ability to program the radios allows more efficient communications when assisting neighboring fire departments.

LOGISTICS OFFICER

As Logistics Officer for the Department, Captain Rich Baxter works under the supervision of the Administrative Support Officer. His primary responsibility is to ensure that minimum daily staffing is maintained. He also makes recommendations for transfers to maintain equal manning levels on each of the three shifts.

Captain Baxter is responsible for the administration of the clothing and protective equipment replacement program, including the authorization and disbursement of issued clothing and equipment.

He coordinates and tracks semi-annual cleaning of protective equipment, maintains uniform and protective equipment inventories, and prepares bid specifications for uniforms and protective equipment contracts. He acts as Records Manager for the department and is in charge of departmental supplies.

The Logistics Officer advises the Fire Chief on operational issues for compliance with Labor Agreements. He assists the Administrative Support Officer to ensure compliance with all Local, State and Federal respiratory protection mandates. He also provides support to the Administrative Staff with payroll/workers' comp issues as required.

PARAMEDIC PROGRAM



RUSSELL GLASS PARAMEDIC COORDINATOR

The Aurora Fire Department EMS Division was very active at the System, Region, and State levels during 2006. In particular, at the State level the Aurora Fire Department helped to solve a number of serious issues regarding EMT testing and communication. Department Paramedics responded to 12,112 calls for assistance related to ambulance operations and treated 10,687 individuals in 2006. In addition, 3 Alternate Response Vehicles (ARVs) made 2,439 responses to assist the EMS Division in treatment and transport of the sick and injured. 95 Paramedics, 80 EMT/Basics, and 22 First Responders served the City of Aurora at the close of 2006.

In April 2006, the EMS Division trained a group of Paramedics in QA,QI of the computerized run report system. In November, 2006 Aurora became the largest department and first system in the State to provide seamless information from pre-hospital to IDPH by way of protected Internet.

2 EMT/Basics successfully completed the Paramedic Program at the Southern Fox Valley EMS System in August 2006 and passed the Illinois Department of Public Health exam.

The Aurora Fire Department CPR Team certified 406 individuals in 2006. 25 AEDs (Automatic External Defibrillators) located throughout the City were upgraded to the new American Heart Association standards. 80 Firefighter/EMTs received EMT-Basic expanded scope skills to improve the level of service we provide to the City. Over 200 firefighters received updated CPR training utilizing the Q-CPR ability of our heart monitors, and in December 2006 replacement AEDs were placed in service on our BLS trucks and engines.

Members of the EMS Division attended numerous school science fairs, community groups, business and career day events, and talked with over 1,000 students regarding Fire Department careers in 2006. The EMS Division supported a number of local events during the year, such as Downtown Alive, Walter Payton's "Sweetness Run", the Aurora Sports Festival, and Aurora University's football and commencement events. Aurora Fire Department ambulances and Paramedics covered EMS details at numerous East and West Aurora High School football games throughout the year.

TECHNICAL RESCUE TEAM

The Aurora Fire Department Technical Rescue Team is comprised of 21 highly trained individuals, dedicated to responding to disasters and serving the citizens of Aurora and the United States. Members receive extensive training in tactics, techniques and specialized equipment dealing with *Vertical Rescue, Trench Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, and Structural Collapse Rescue.*

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INCIDENT TEAM



Lt. Joe Bartholomew, Haz-Mat Response Team Coordinator

The Aurora Fire Department Haz-Mat Response Team (HMRT) has 30 members with 23 at the Tech B level, 7 at the Tech A level, 10 with chemistry training, and 9 with ICS training. Eleven of our team members instruct at the Southern Kane County Training Association and three of our members teach at the Illinois Fire Service Institute, Haz-Mat Division.

The Aurora Fire Department Haz-Mat Response Team (HMRT) is also a member of MABAS (Mutual Aid Box Alarm System) Division 13, which incorporates most of Kane County. The Aurora Fire Department HMRT and other members of MABAS Division 13, including department members from Batavia, Elburn, Geneva, Montgomery, North Aurora, St. Charles and Sugar Grove, has recently formed a Division-wide Team that includes 72 members.

In 2006 the Aurora Fire Department responded to 308 hazardous materials response calls, including spills, leaks and unknowns. 297 of these calls were Level 1 responses (1-2 Company responses) and 38 were multi-unit responses, which included natural gas leaks and multi-company odor investigations.



Members of the Aurora Fire Department Haz-Mat Team responded to a chlorine leak in Oswego in December 2006 with the MABAS Division 13 Haz-Mat Response Team.

The Aurora Fire Department HMRT conducts monthly Training Drills including suit training, use of monitors, tabletop drills, and a department-wide decontamination drill. Four mandatory MABAS 13 Haz-Mat drills are held each year for all division personnel.

FIRE INVESTIGATION DIVISION

The Aurora Fire Department Investigations Bureau investigated 55 fires during 2006. First listed as suspicious, undetermined, or incendiary resulted in losses in excess of \$2.5 million dollars.

Seven arrests were made in 2006. Law enforcement agencies that assisted the Aurora Fire Department include the DuPage and Kane County Fire Investigation Task Forces, Aurora Police Department, and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. The Kane and DuPage County States Attorney's Offices also assisted the Aurora Fire Department with legal counsel in some of our arson cases.

The networking of resources, manpower, training, communications and legal expertise has had a major impact on the increased number of arrests and convictions.

The Department appreciates the efforts of all our Fire Investigators for their professionalism and dedication.

JUVENILE FIRESETTER PROGRAM



Battalion Chief Ed Oros Lead Investigator

During 2006, members of the department who are trained in the area of Juvenile Firesetting counseled eleven youths who were known to have started fires, one of which resulted in a monetary loss. For the fourth consecutive year, there was a significant reduction in the number of fires started by juveniles. We believe this is due a combination of aggressive fire prevention programs in the schools and increased public education and awareness. The responsibility of our Juvenile Intervention Specialists is to measure the youths' level of risk in relationship to the probability of setting more fires. We provide an educational program designed for their level of understanding. In some cases, other agencies are asked to assist or intervene. Property damage resulting from juvenile firesetters was lower than the previous three years.

There are currently 13 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Team members.

At the close of 2006, the Aurora Fire Department Water Rescue Team had a roster of 20 active members.

In 2006 heavy rainfall created high water levels and fast moving currents in the Fox River. Local and outlying law enforcement agencies called for assistance throughout the year for weapons and other evidence recovery as well as for homicide investigations. The Water Rescue Team also assisted the Haz-Mat Team in containment and clean-up of chemicals that spilled into local retention ponds in the area.

Training continued to be a high priority in 2006. Training at the Southern Kane County quarry proved to be invaluable as the team participated and took runners-up honors at the Lynwood Fire Department Dive Team Challenge. Sixteen team members took part in the event that included dive challenges ranging from missing fisherman to evidence documentation. Ten events made for a great day of training for all who attended.

COMMUNICATIONS / TECHNICAL SUPPORT

Throughout 2006 work has continued in the many existing projects previously begun. Improvements and updates with the Remote Access mapping software continue. Work has begun to expand the wireless network within the City. The Verizon network currently in use in our vehicle laptops will eventually be supplemented by the City Metro Fi Project, which has been in progress since midyear. The systems will eventually work together to get maximum city coverage and signal strength.

The Northeastern Illinois Communications Consortium (NICC), which includes the Aurora Fire Department, continues to gather information towards the next generation of a digital communications system to replace the current analog system in use.

Automatic Vehicle Locator (AVL) work was reestablished and has become a citywide project. The AVL project will aid in reducing emergency response time to our citizens by dispatching the closest unit through the CAD System.

The Emergency Vehicle Preemption project continued throughout the year and is in the final phase of completion. To date, 121 intersections have incorporated the Opticom preemption system with another 41 intersections left to be completed. The remaining traffic signals lie within the state highways within the City.




EXPLORER POST #99




