The Aurora Fire Department, much like all other City departments, was tasked in 2011 with providing the same service level with a reduced budget and less manpower. The Fire Department budget was funded to \$34,631,000.00, allowing the Department to support its nine firehouses, vehicles and equipment, and a staff of 195.

The men and women of the Aurora Fire Department should be proud of their efforts in 2011. When faced with difficult times, they all met the challenges head on and worked through them.

The Department continues to seek supplements to our operating budget and explore opportunities through grants. In 2011 we applied for a video conferencing grant through F.E.M.A., which would allow us to conference with all nine fire stations. This would allow for some great training opportunities while still being able to provide coverage to first due territories.

The economic downturn had an effect on operations in January of 2011, with the "brownout" of Truck Company #11 on the City's far West side. Thankfully that was able to be reversed in September 2011, returning us to full normal operations of all frontline equipment.

OPERATIONS



ASSISTANT CHIEF MARK LOCKWOOD OPERATIONS

The Operations Division is responsible for delivering emergency services to those citizens who live in, work in, and visit the City of Aurora. Operations Division members respond to all calls for emergency services, including incidents involving fires, emergency medical services, technical rescue response, release of hazardous materials, and water rescue, to name a few. Mutual Aid responses are provided to surrounding fire departments who are members of MABAS Division 13.

In 2011 the Aurora Fire Department responded to over 15,500 calls for emergency service. The City is divided into two Battalions, with Battalion 1 on the east side of the Fox River and Battalion 2 on the west side. Each battalion operates under the direction of a Battalion Chief assigned to oversee the coordination of 5 Fire Companies. Apparatus assigned to the Operations Division are designed to address the wide spectrum of emergency responses within the City of Aurora, as follows:

- 9 Engine Companies charged with extinguishment and designated as Basic Life Support (BLS) units. 3 of these Engines are Advanced Life Support (ALS) equipped.
- 3 Truck Companies are designated to perform search and rescue, forcible entry, victim rescue, and extrication, to name a few.
- 6 ALS Ambulance Companies

Special Operations capabilities include:

- **Hazardous Materials Response Team**: Investigates and mitigates hazardous materials releases, including decontamination of both victims and responders at both large– and small-scale incidents.
- **Technical Rescue Team**: Provides the expertise necessary to perform specialized rescue operations in collapsed structures, confined space, trenches, and high angle rescue.
- Water Rescue Team: Charged with the life safety of all citizens in and around Aurora's waterways.

The Operations Division continues to provide the resources and training necessary for our Firefighters to accomplish their jobs safely and effectively. We look forward to a safe and productive 2012 for the men and women of the Aurora Fire Department.





TRAINING DIVISION

Aurora Firefighters had a total of 65,949 combined regular training hours during 2011. In addition, 81 firefighters spent 1,840 hours training for "Special Teams" and Illinois Fire Institute classes, including Fire Officers, Haz-Mat Technician, Winter Fire College, and the 75th Annual Fire College held at the University of Illinois.

In February and March 2011 all fire companies participated in a driver training course held at the Phillips Park Aquatic Center. In April, companies trained on the burn tower at the Southern Kane Country Training Center in North Aurora. In May, Officers attended an in house inspections class while others trained at the burn tower. In July, all available personnel attended a helicopter class at Station 4. In November and December, companies trained at the burn tower along with members of the Naperville Fire Department.

During 2011, the Aurora Fire Department submitted 46 claims for reimbursement to the Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal, Division of Personnel Standards and Education. These included training for Firefighter II and Firefighter III, as well as specialized training such as Fire Prevention Principles, Tactics and Strategy, Management, Instructor, Fire Apparatus Engineer, Incident Command, Vehicle Operator, and Haz-Mat Technician.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES DIVISION

2011 was a busy year for members of the EMS Division. EMS Support Officer Greg Jackman attended numerous local, regional and State level meetings and events to support the Aurora Fire Department on EMS related issues. Battalion Chief Davids continued to attend the State EMS Advisory Board to represent Region IX on EMS issues. These meetings are held in Springfield and include members from all EMS regions in the State of Illinois. He also attends the Region IX EMS and trauma meetings.

Aurora Fire Department Paramedics responded to 11,766 calls for assistance related to ambulance operations during 2011. They treated 11,919 individuals. In addition, three alternate response vehicles (ARV's) responded to 2,404 requests to assist in the treatment of sick and injured patients.

96 Paramedics, 86 EMT/Basics, and nine First Responders served the City of Aurora at the close of 2011. In December, two Firefighters completed their Paramedic training.

In February 2011, all ten ambulances passed the Illinois Department of Public Aid (IDPH) and Southern Fox Valley EMS inspections and all four ARV's (Paramedic engines) successfully passed inspection by IDPH in September. Three replacement ambulances (Medic 3, Medic 4 and Medic 5) were placed into service in 2011.

The Aurora Fire Department CPR team certified 59 individuals in 2011.

Members of the EMS Division and the Aurora Fire Department attended numerous school science fairs, community groups, business and career day events, and talked with over 1,000 students regarding fire service careers in 2011. Aurora Fire Department ambulances and paramedics covered EMS details at numerous Aurora high school football games at all four school districts throughout the year.

The EMS division assisted with a number of events during the year, such as Downtown Alive, the Aurora Sports Festival, and Aurora University's football and commencement events.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INCIDENT TEAM



Battalion Chief Don Davids Haz-Mat Team Leader

The Aurora Fire Department Hazardous Materials Response Team (HMRT) has 30 members, with 21 at the Tech B level, nine at the Tech A level, ten with chemistry training, and nine with ICS training. Several of our team members instruct at the Southern Kane County Training Association and two of our members teach at the Haz-Mat Division of the Illinois Fire Service Institute. The Aurora Fire Department HMRT is also a member of MABAS (Mutual Aid Box Alarm System) Division 13, which incorporates most of Kane County. The Aurora Fire Department HMRT and other members of MABAS Division 13, including department members from Batavia, Elburn, Geneva, Montgomery, North Aurora, St. Charles and Sugar Grove, have worked together for the past several years as a Division-wide team that includes 70 members.

In 2011 the Aurora Fire Department responded to 221 hazardous materials response calls, which include, single engine responses for minor spills and gas leaks and team responses for larger incidents. In additions AFD truck companies handled 444 calls for possible elevated levels of Carbon Monoxide

The Aurora Fire Department HMRT conducts monthly training drills, including suit training, use of monitors, tabletop drills, and a department-wide decontamination drill. Four MABAS 13 Haz-Mat drills are held each year for all division personnel. The Aurora Fire Department HMRT assisted with several Division 13 full team incidents and other advisory requests.

In 2011 Division 13 HMRT was issued by MABAS, 6 new level A entry suits for use when vapor protective clothing is required. The team currently carries 6 additional suits for a total of 12 suits. We also began to participate in the ILEAS PRND program and received personal radiation detectors and radio isotope identification devices. Several team members participated as evaluators in Champaign at the 2011 Hazmat team validation.

FIRE INVESTIGATION DIVISION

The Aurora Fire Department Investigations Bureau investigated 37 fires during 2011, resulting in approximately \$4,550,000 in losses to buildings and contents. Five of these fires were determined to be electrical, five were accidental in nature, 13 were the result of arson, one was the result of a juvenile firesetter, and 13 were undetermined in cause. The department's Fire Investigation Team was comprised of 12 members at the close of 2011.

Law enforcement agencies that assisted the Aurora Fire Department included the DuPage and Kane County Fire Investigation Task Forces, Aurora Police Department, and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. One individual faced charges of arson in connection with a fire in Aurora during 2011.

The networking of resources, manpower, training, communications and legal expertise has had a major impact on the increased number of arrests and convictions. The Department appreciates the efforts of all our Fire Investigators for their professionalism and dedication.

JUVENILE FIRESETTER PROGRAM

During 2011 members of the department who are trained in the area of Juvenile Firesetting counseled 11 youths who were known to have started fires. For the eighth consecutive year, there was a significant reduction in the number of fires started by juveniles. We contribute this to a combination of aggressive fire prevention programs in the schools as well as increased public education and awareness. The responsibility of our Juvenile Intervention Specialists is to measure the youths' level of risk in relationship to the probability of setting more fires. We provide an educational program designed for their level of understanding. In some cases, other agencies are asked to assist or intervene.

There are currently 10 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Team Members.


