

#### **OPERATIONS**



ASSISTANT CHIEF MARK LOCKWOOD OPERATIONS

The Operations Division is responsible for delivering emergency services to those citizens who live in, work in, and visit the City of Aurora. Operations Division members respond to all calls for emergency services, including incidents involving fires, emergency medical services, technical rescue response, release of hazardous materials, and water rescue, to name a few. Mutual Aid responses are provided to surrounding fire departments who are members of MABAS Division 13.

In 2012 the Aurora Fire Department responded to over 15,900 calls for emergency service. The City is divided into two Battalions, with Battalion 1 on the east side of the Fox River and Battalion 2 on the west side. Each battalion operates under the direction of a Battalion Chief assigned to oversee the coordination of 5 Fire Companies. Apparatus assigned to the Operations Division are designed to address the wide spectrum of emergency responses within the City of Aurora, as follows:

- 9 Engine Companies charged with extinguishment and designated as Basic Life Support (BLS) units. 3 of these Engines are Advanced Life Support (ALS) equipped.
- 3 Truck Companies are designated to perform search and rescue, forcible entry, victim rescue, and extrication, to name a few.
- 6 ALS Ambulance Companies

Special Operations capabilities include:

- **Hazardous Materials Response Team**: Investigates and mitigates hazardous materials releases, including decontamination of both victims and responders at both large– and small-scale incidents.
- **Technical Rescue Team**: Provides the expertise necessary to perform specialized rescue operations in collapsed structures, confined space, trenches, and high angle rescue.
- Water Rescue Team: Charged with the life safety of all citizens in and around Aurora's waterways.

The Operations Division continues to provide and seek innovative resources, techniques and training for our Firefighters to accomplish their jobs safely and effectively. We look forward to a safe and productive 2013 for the men and women of the Aurora Fire Department.

### **BUILDING & GROUNDS**

The Aurora Fire Department has nine fire stations strategically located throughout the city. The Company Captain at each station is responsible for routine maintenance and upkeep of the building and grounds. Major maintenance projects are coordinated though the Support Services office.




A major project accomplished in 2012 was the replacement of the emergency back-up generator at Central Station. The replacement generator is a six-year old unit that previously provided emergency power to the 911 Dispatch Center at the former Police Department building. The original Fire Department generator, installed in 1980, only powered a limited number of circuits. The replacement unit now powers the entire building which will allow Fire Department Administration to continue to function in the event of a power outage.

#### TRAINING DIVISION

Aurora Firefighters had a total of 64,207 combined regular training hours during 2012. In addition, 133 firefighters spent 2,592 hours training for "Special Teams" and Illinois Fire Institute classes, including Fire Officers, Haz-Mat Technician, Winter Fire College, and Child Passenger Car Seat Installations Class.

In March, April, July, August and September 2012 all fire companies participated in a various training course held at the Jericho Circle site. In October, November and December all companies trained on the burn tower at the Southern Kane County Training Center in North Aurora. Also in December, all company officers attended a class for the department's new video conferencing equipment.

During 2012, the Aurora Fire Department submitted 9 claims for reimbursement to the Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal, Division of Personnel Standards and Education. These included training for Firefighter II and Haz-Mat Operations.

2012 was a busy year for members of the EMS Division. EMS Support Officer Greg Jackman attended numerous local, regional and State level meetings and events to support the Aurora Fire Department on EMS related issues. Battalion Chief Davids continued to attend the State EMS Advisory Board to represent Region IX on EMS issues. These meetings are held in Springfield and include members from all EMS regions in the State of Illinois. He also attends the Region IX EMS and trauma meetings.

Aurora Fire Department Paramedics responded to 12,307 calls for assistance related to ambulance operations during 2012. They treated 12,438 individuals. In addition, three alternate response vehicles (ARV's) responded to 2,718 requests to assist in the treatment of sick and injured patients.


96 Paramedics, 86 EMT/Basics, and 8 First Responders served the City of Aurora at the close of 2012. In December, five Firefighters completed their Paramedic training.

In February 2012, all ambulances passed the Illinois Department of Public Aid (IDPH) and Southern Fox Valley EMS inspections and all ARV's (Paramedic engines) successfully passed inspection by IDPH in September.

The Aurora Fire Department CPR team certified 576 individuals in 2012 which include all AFD members, Aurora Police Department and City of Aurora employees.

Members of the EMS Division and the Aurora Fire Department attended numerous school science fairs, community groups, business and career day events, and talked with over 1,000 students regarding fire service careers in 2012. Aurora Fire Department ambulances and paramedics covered EMS details at numerous Aurora high school football games at all four school districts throughout the year.

The EMS division assisted with a number of events during the year, such as Downtown Alive, the Aurora Sports Festival, and Aurora University's football and commencement events.

#### HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INCIDENT TEAM

The Aurora Fire Department Hazardous Materials Response Team (HMRT) has 30 members, with 21 at the Tech B level, nine at the Tech A level, ten with chemistry training, and nine with ICS training. Several of our team members instruct at the Southern Kane County Training Association and two of our members teach at the Haz-Mat Division of the Illinois Fire Service Institute. The Aurora Fire Department HMRT is a member of MABAS (Mutual Aid Box Alarm System) Division 13, which incorporates most of Kane County. The Aurora Fire Department HMRT and other members of MABAS Division 13, including department members from Batavia, Elburn, Geneva, Montgomery, North Aurora, St. Charles and Sugar Grove, have worked together for the past several years as a Division-wide team that includes 70 members.

In 2012 the Aurora Fire Department responded to 227 hazardous materials response calls, which include, single engine responses for minor spills and gas leaks and team responses for larger incidents. In additions AFD truck companies handled 349 calls for possible elevated levels of Carbon Monoxide

The Aurora Fire Department HMRT conducts monthly training drills, including suit training, use of monitors, tabletop drills, and a department-wide decontamination drill. Four MABAS 13 Haz-Mat drills are held each year for all division personnel. The Aurora Fire Department HMRT assisted with several Division 13 full team incidents and other advisory requests.

In 2012 the AFD Hazmat team members worked with the Burlington Northern Santa Fe railroad on a small scale Hazmat drill that simulated a leaking Anhydrous Ammonia car located in the Eola Rail yard in Aurora. Hazmat team members and on shift personnel responded, evaluated and mitigated the simulated leak with good success.

### FIRE INVESTIGATION DIVISION

The Aurora Fire Department Investigations Bureau investigated 57 fires during 2012, resulting in approximately \$3,150,000 in losses to buildings and contents. 16 of these fires were determined to be accidental in nature, 21 were the result of arson, four were the result of a juvenile firesetter, and 16 were undetermined in cause. The department's Fire Investigation Team was comprised of 12 members at the close of 2012.

Law enforcement agencies that assisted the Aurora Fire Department included the DuPage and Kane County Fire Investigation Task Forces, Aurora Police Department, and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. One individual faced charges of arson in connection with a fire in Aurora during 2012.

The networking of resources, manpower, training, communications and legal expertise has had a major impact on the increased number of arrests and convictions. The Department appreciates the efforts of all our Fire Investigators for their professionalism and dedication.

### **JUVENILE FIRESETTER PROGRAM**

During 2012 the Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Team worked with 13 youths, including completing comprehensive fire risk assessments and working with them one-on-one to increase fire danger awareness. If needed, the youths are referred to outside agencies for counseling. Youths are brought into the program by parents concerned with their fire play, because of information gathered during a fire department response, or because they were ordered to complete the program by the legal system.

Children start 50% of all fires, and juvenile fire setting is the leading cause of home deaths among children. This is why the team works to deter future fire setting by these youths.

There are currently 11 Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Team members.

A new CAD to Fire Station Alerting system interface was installed and configure at the 911 Dispatch Center. The interface will allow more expedient alerting of fire units by alerting multiple stations simultaneously rather than one at a time.

Twelve fire vehicle laptop computers were replaced as the old units approached the end-of-service life. Several fire stations received addition monitors or dispatch printers so that call information would be available in different areas of the building. Some of the desktop computers were also replaced in order to support the new operating system platform.

#### 2012 FIREFIGHTER OF THE YEAR

The Exchange Club of Aurora hosted the 2012 Firefighter of the Year Awards luncheon at the Gaslite Manor on October 23, 2012. 15 firefighters were nominated for the award. The keynote speaker at the event was Aurora Fire Department Retired Captain Ray Pfeiffer.

Nominees for Aurora's 2012 Firefighter of the Year were:

- ❖ Battalion Chief Tim Pogue, Pvt. Dwayne Love and Pvt. John Ross (pictured at right) were nominated for their actions in assistance as The Departments' Technical Rescue team for a person that was trapped inside a sand hopper at a concrete plant.
- ❖ Lieutenant Robert Warren, Pvt. Jason Larson, Pvt. Ray Torres, Pvt. John Bonior and Pvt. Steve Matthias were nominated for their actions when responding to a vehicle accident with a victim in cardiac arrest. Through the use of early defibrillation, CPR and other advance treatments performed in an expedient manner, responding personnel were able to save the life of the victim.
- ❖ Lieutenant Steve Kish, Pvt. Matt Anslow, Pvt. Corey Fryer, Pvt. Joshua Murray and Pvt. Mark Long were nominated for their action responding to a call for a 55 year old female having chest pains. All personnel were engaged in providing the best possible care needed to prevent irreversible heart muscle damage that usually occurs in heart attack patients.
- ❖ Lieutenant Brandon Matson and Pvt. Eric Calkins were nominated for actions when responded to a house fire on the east side of Aurora. Upon arrival the firefighters were advised that there was a victim trapped in one of the bedrooms. Both commenced with search and rescue operations, despite the worsening heat and smoke conditions, and were successful in location the victim who was entangled in a cable between the dresser and bed.

Lieutenant Brandon Matson and Pvt. Eric Calkins were presented with the Exchange Club of Aurora's 2012 Firefighter of the Year Award. Lt. Brandon Matson Joined the Department in August 2000 and has been a paramedic since January 2001. He was promoted to Lieutenant in January 2010. Pvt. Eric Calkins joined the Department in March 1997.




